We gather in community to nourish souls, transform lives, and do justice.



Before last weekend I might have written something like "This first year at First UU has been quite a ride," but now I have been to the rodeo. We sampled BBQ at the BBQ cook-off, listened to kids squealing on the tilt-a-whirl, admired boots and hats, and walked past the freak show. Luridly colored pictures advertised a two-headed snake and the

shrunken head of a missionary, "The victim of his last sermon." I felt a little chill, and resolved to stay away from stew pots. The main event was the rodeo itself. The bleachers were slowly filling up while the clown had fun with the crowd and the announcer. Cowgirls rode at full gallop around the ring carrying the flags of the event sponsors. Then they let the first bucking horse loose. I saw what I thought was a rag doll strapped to its back, being flung this way and that say, neck flopping wildly like it wasn't connected by bones. When I realized it was a real guy, I was shocked. I felt as if I were watching a car wreck! He got off and walked away, but slowly. The guys who helped him off were brave too, riding up right next to the still-bucking horse, and their horses were brave, and I kept being impressed with every rider after that.

Now, instead of saying, "it's been quite a ride," I'll just say that this first year has been wonderful, and full of changes. Chicago newspaper columnist Sydney J. Harris described his take on change: "Our dilemma is that we hate change and love it at the same time; what we really want is for things to remain the same but get better." This year the church changed its governance structure to "Policy Governance," which just means that we steer by goals and policies. One of the first goals mentioned in the "Ends Statements" is that we want to be an intentionally

welcoming place. The building where the offices and classrooms are was dimly lit, without a discernible main entrance, so we're changing the entrance to be more open, well-lit, and staffed by a volunteer church host who answers the phone when people call and who welcomes folks who walk in. At this point the Welcome Center is awaiting the arrival of specialists. This is a good experiment for us, to see what construction is like, as it is likely that we will be building in the future. There is always something that comes up that delays the process. In our case it's being unable to remove old carpet from the linoleum tile without pulling up bits of the tile. The tile from that era always has a bit of asbestos in it, so we called in the experts, who, on Monday, April 16, will come seal the area and safely remove the asbestos. It shouldn't cause too much inconvenience, as the office is closed on Mondays. Former President of the congregation, Don Smith, has helped us pick out the colors for the wall, one of which is appropriately called "Zeus."

We have expanded the "Chalice Circle" program so members can get to know one another on a deeper level in small groups. We've begun having child care and supper every Wednesday evening at 6, and offering Adult Religious Education classes or movies and discussions after dinner. We're following the Covenant of Healthy Relations, and will be featuring it more and more. We were able to make a connection with Occupy Austin, inviting them to dinner and talking to them about our common ground. The church is "leaving the building" now and then to go protest for marriage equality, school funding, women's health. The energy around the church is rising and hopeful. We'll try to keep the changes well-paced so no one feels like screaming, and no one has to stagger around getting their bearings like the kids and the cowboys! -The Rev. Meg Barnhouse

April 1: "How Many UU's Does it Take to Change a Light Bulb?" with Rev. Meg Barnhouse. What do UU jokes tell us about ourselves? How true are they? Some sting: a UU family moves into a new neighborhood. Their little girl finds a new playmate, and they are happily getting to know each other. One day, the playmate says, "We're Episcopalians, what are you?" The UU child thinks for a minute and says, "I'm not sure, but I think we're League of Women Voters." Let's laugh and think together!

April 8: Easter Sunday: "Quartet For the End of Time" with Rev. Meg Barnhouse. The quartet, "Quartet For the End of Time," was premiered in Stalag VIII-A in Görlitz, Germany (currently Zgorzelec, Poland) on January 15, 1941, to an audience of about four hundred fellow prisoners of war and prison guards. Composer Olivier Messiaen, an inmate of the camp, later recalled of the occasion, "Never was I listened to with such rapt attention and comprehension." The story of this music is an inspirational example of freedom and beauty rising in the midst of death and destruction, a fitting story for Easter Sunday. A live quartet will play excerpts from the piece intertwined with the words of the sermon.

April 15: "Grasshoppers in the Glittering Net" with Rev. Meg Barnhouse Our seventh principle is that we affirm and promote "Respect for the interdependent web of all existence of which we are a part." An image from Hinduism is "Indra's Net," a web connecting the whole, where each part also contains the whole. What does it mean to respect that web, to be a part of it?

April 22 Earth Day: "The Gaia Psalms":

Composer: Kiya Heartwood.

Words: by Meg Barnhouse and Kiya Heartwood

Narration: by Meg Barnhouse. The Gaia Psalms are eight pieces written to be part of a special Unitarian Universalist Earth Day Service. The concept of this work is to create an interactive multi-generational multi-media worship experience that is both moving and simple. Artists are creating altars for the four directions. Children and adults are encouraged to come dressed as a part of the great web: animal, bird, fish, tree, flower...

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The Forum

April 1: Dr. Bill Martin, "Drug abuse is a problem. Prohibition is not the solution." Few would dispute that illicit drug use and abuse is one of the most prominent and perplexing issues facing our society. In this discussion, Bill Martin will show that current U.S. drug policy ignores or contradicts the best statistical evidence we have regarding drug use and abuse and will discuss plausible alternatives for changing these policies. Dr. Martin is the Harry and Hazel Senior Fellow for Religion and Public Policy at the James A. Baker III Institute for Public Policy at Rice University, where he also directs the program in Drug Policy.

April 8: Easter, No Forum

April 15: Constable Bruce Elfant, "The Constable's Office within County Government: A Progressive Vision" Bruce Elfant has served as Travis County Constable of Precinct Five since 1993. The primary mission of his office is to execute civil and criminal process in accordance with federal and state laws. They are on the front lines of law enforcement, patrol, security, investigations, and arrests. Constable Elfant, is helping develop innovative programs to divert veterans, non violent offenders, drug abusers, and persons with mental illness from jail to treatment and rehabilitation services. He has earned two Texas Association of Counties "Best Practices Awards" for Exceptional Delivery of Services. He is recognized at the state level and nationally for his progressive vision of the intersection of the criminal justice system with needed human services.

April 22 Simone Wicha, "Our Blanton is the Heart of Art in Central Texas" Simone Wicha is the Director of the Blanton Museum of Art. Ms. Wicha's discussion touch the wide ranging influence of the Blanton. She will show pictures from the Blanton artists on the cutting edge of today's social problems as well as the role of art in influencing the national and international dialogues dealing with these issues. Minority artists, African Americans, Latinos, Native Americans and Asian Americans art will be shown. She will talk about the efforts of politicians to control the expression and exhibition of art that support and conflict with their agendas.

April 29: Ricardo Ainslie Ph.D, "Understanding Mexico's Drug War" Ricardo Ainslie Ph.D. is a psychologist-psychoanalyst who uses books, documentary films, and photographic exhibits to highlight subjects of social and cultural importance. His books and films cover issues of race, violence, and social change, immigration, drug wars and kidnapping. His books include: No Dancin' in Anson: An American Story of Race and Social Change (1995) and Long Dark Road: Bill King and the Murder in Jasper, Texas (2004), and The Savior of Juarez: Mexico at the Time of the Great Drug War (in press). A native of Mexico City, he is a Professor of Counseling Psychology at University of Texas and is becoming an acclaimed documentary film maker.

April's Special Offering for 1st UU's Hands On Housing

On Sunday, April 8th, 1st UU's own Hands On Housing program will be our monthly special offering recipient at both services. Hands On Housing volunteer teams repair and revitalize the homes of low-income elderly and disabled homeowners who cannot afford to pay for these repairs. Our UU team recruits volunteers from 1st UU, Live Oak, Wildflower, San Marcos, the UU Fellowship, Georgetown, and even UUs visiting from other states. Our work helps these individuals and families remain in the homes they love. At the same time, UU volunteers have a very rewarding experience, helping others in need while enjoying UU friendships. There are two Hands On Housing projects each year – April's spring Bluebonnet Blitz and October's Raise the Roof event.

First UU has been involved with Hands On Housing since at least 1991 – and perhaps even earlier. Thanks to the leadership of Jon Montgomery, aka "Mr. Hands On Housing," UU teams have been going strong ever since. Since the early 2000s, our UU team has usually been the largest volunteer team in the city. Many members and friends of our congregation have been actively involved with Hands On Housing – from toddlers to folks in their 70s, from novices to expert carpenters and contractors. Our team is responsible for purchasing the painting and construction supplies for our projects. We also provide lunch for our hard-working volunteers. 



Austin Presence Group





discuss the books in depth. Our only expert authority is the author him/ herself. It is required that each participant read the book. We meet every Sunday at 10:30 a.m. Join our group!




A Thrilling Civil War Spy Drama Sisters Under the Skin

THE FUTURE OF LIFESPAN RELIGIOUS EDUCATION AT FIRST UU AUSTIN


On Saturday, March 10 close to 20 people gathered to consider our strengths, growing edges and the future of religious education at First UU. The program was facilitated by Jennifer Nichols, Director of Lifespan Faith Development for the District. Jennifer gave a brief outline of the study entitled, "Faith Formation 2020." http://www.lifelongfaith.com/faith-formation-2020.html. The study looks at the trends facing the many generations that are a part of church life across many denominations and the findings are

relevant to the future of Unitarian Universalist churches. One of the most important findings of this study is the fact that younger generations are seeking more spirituality in their lives as opposed to any "organized religion."

This fact needs to be taken into account as we plan how we "do" faith development in the 21st century.

The group identified several strengths about First UU including: Our new minister, the development of our mission, values and covenant and how programming at First UU is mission focused. The Music program and our commitment to Social Action are both great strengths. This group also stated that the new Welcome Center is a wonderful leap forward.

Hopes for the future include: offering Sunday lunches as a way of building community, more lighting on the property at night, a stronger young adult ministry, Support groups or support






NEW IMMIGRATION AS A MORAL ISSUE:




