Thanks for Being Up to the Challenge



he 30,000 Challenge has been met! This congregation came through to support a new staff position: Director of Membership and Communications. With this many members, some churches hire a second minister, and others surround their one minister with people who support, extend and amplify what the one minister can do.

This staff person will be in charge of knowing everything that's going on around here and making sure what the people who should know about an event or a program have the opportunity to know about it. S/he will also arrange to follow each new member through the first year of their membership at First UU, and

that people are able to get as engaged with the life of the church as they would like to be. With this \$60,000, we have the first 15-18 months of the costs of this posi-

tion covered, and it is our expectation that with the increased flow of energy, information, and inspiration provided by this new staff member, one of the ways the church will benefit is in the increased hope and commitment that leads to a powerful financial support for the mission of the congregation.

Why did the original donors step forward? In reading a book on generosity, they came across the description of the Islamic tenet of zakat, the

annual donation of 2.5 percent of one's holdings to charity. Many of us have income, where the traditional share to be given to the church is 10 percent. Some have to figure out what to give inotherways. What this congregations asks and expects is that its members will be "generous within their means." In moving toward whole-

ness and liberation for their spirit, in seeking to be generous people in the world, these donors offered us a challenge. I am so happy to be able to say "Let's

celebrate!" because many of you took them up on their invitation to be generous. We are here to gather in community, to nourish souls, transform lives, and do justice. Let's see how much further along this path we can walk together next year. A big "thank you!" to our challenging donors and to all of those who helped meet their challenge.

FIRST UU CAMPUS GOES SMOKE-FREEHealth Effects, Litter Led to Decision

Beginning June 1, our campus went tobacco-free. The building has been smoke-free for years. Smoking harms nearly every organ of the body, causing many diseases and reducing the health of smokers in general. (The Health Consequences of Smoking: A Report of the Surgeon General, 2004). Use of spit tobacco, cigars, pipes, and other tobacco products also lead to disease and death (American Cancer Society). There is no safe level of exposure to secondhand smoke (The Health Consequences of Involuntary Exposure to Tobacco Smoke: A Report of the Surgeon General, 2006).

Since we are dedicated to providing a healthy, comfortable and productive environment, we are concerned about the health effects and litter associated with smoking, so we are joining with efforts of organizations across Austin to create another space where the air is healthy and the grounds are clean. Witness & Advocacy Make a Difference Corinna Whiteaker-Lewis, Outgoing Social Justice Chair

How did you put your stamp on the job?

I tried to provide consistent support to the projects we had going and I believe in so doing helped elevate their profile within the life of the church. I like to think that this ultimately



helped to make social justice more clearly a central part of who we are and what we do here, as reflected in our mission.

What's special about the UU's approach?

Long-time volunteers with Freeze Nights like to tell a story about how the folks we serve like our church better than the others because we don't preach at them, and our food is the best. I think that sums up the UU approach—we meet people where they're at, get them what they need with care and quality, and make no creedal demands in return.

Proudest achievment?

I am so happy our project volunteers and coordinators are a reliable source of support for the populations they serve. People's Community Clinic, Hands on Housing (left), and the Cold

Weather Shelter Program, just to name a few, are all the better because of our involvement. This church IS making a difference.

What are your hopes for social justice?

I look forward to vibrant new ideas growing from the solid foundation this church provides. I'm so encouraged by the leadership our minister is providing in the public arena around social justice issues, and hope it leads to continuing witness and advocacy - areas of social justice work that will complement our proven commitment to service.

Sharing More than Food Linda Buehlmann, Outgoing Sharing Supper Coordinator

What drew you to the Sharing Suppers?

One of the first events I attended when I joined First UU was a Sharing Supper. It was there I met a woman who became one of my best friends in Austin. I loved the warmth and sense of belonging I felt at those first SS.

In 2009, three members of the church came to my house and asked if I would consider being the coordinator. I said yes right away because it was one way in which I could "pay back" for all the wonderful evenings I'd experienced and I believed in the goal-to make people feel welcome in our church.

For the three-plus years that I have coordinated SS, I have made so many good friends and enjoyed every supper.

What makes for a good sharing supper?

The most satisfying part is seeing those folks come who really knew no one at the church and to watch them blossom, become members, and then start hosting a supper or two. I have noticed that people feel comfortable very quickly when a small group is involved. Since everyone contribute, it's easy to feel a part of the group.

Other memorable times of your tenure?

I felt gratified when there were four homes that people gathered in at one month. And I definitely was proud when I heard that new members had recognized Sharing Suppers as one thing that made a difference to them.




PARADOX PLAYERS

Up from Here? Challenges of and Barriers to Economic Revival

WITH JAMES K. GALBRAITH PHD

This talk is one of a series sponsored by First UU addressing the question "How Much is Enough?" James will discuss his recent research on inequality in the world economy and on the financial crisis. He will highlight trends toward concentration of wealth in the hands of a few and and attendant political and social risks. James holds the Lloyd M. Bentsen Jr. Chair of Government/ Business Relations at the LBJ School of Public Affairs at UT-Austin and a professorship in Government. His most recent book, Inequality and Instability: A Study of the World Economy, has just been published by Oxford University Press. In the 1990s he served as chief technical adviser for macroeconomic reform to the People's Republic of China. He is a senior scholar with the Levy Economics Institute and president of the Association for Evolutionary Economics.

Your Food Future

WITH RICHARD SOMMER

Richard Sommer will discuss bees and their crucial relationship to agriculture. He will provide an update on bee colony collapse issues and other issues that threaten food production. Richard, a member of First UU, has served as president of the Nebraska Honey Producers Association and chair of the Nebraska Environmental Quality Council. He is a geographer for the U.S. Department of Agriculture Animal and Plant Health Inspection Service, Plant Protection, and Quarantine Agency. He has also spent 20 years providing pollination services and in honey production in Western Nebraska.

Invasive Species

WITH DR. JACK DELOACH

Jack will discuss his research in controlling saltcedar, a highly damaging tree from Central Asia. Using leaf beetles from the Old World, which can reproduce only on some saltcedar species, this biocontrol project has resulted in control of 2,000 stream miles from California to Colorado, and about 200 miles in western Texas. Jack received his PhD from NC State University in 1964 and worked on biological control with the US Department of Agriculture for 48 years. He has received four national and international awards for this research.

Is Happiness Really a Warm Puppy?

WITH WENDY DOMJAN PHD

People think they know what it is to be happy, even if the experience is elusive. Yet recent scientific research shows that the nature of happiness may be more complicated and interesting. The talk will identify the factors known to contribute to happiness and the ways we enhance or limit happiness in our own lives. Wendy Domjan earned a PhD in cognitive psychology from the University of Wisconsin-Madison in 1977. She is Distinguished Senior Lecturer in Psychology and the assistant director of the Plan II Honors Program at UT-Austin. She has won numerous teaching awards, most recently the Regents' Outstanding Teacher Award.
