Il aboard for the long haul! Pledge 1-2-3 is the theme of this fall's stewardship drive. We're picturing First UU as a train, on track to be the church of our hopes, the church that carries us and our children into a future of strong UU identity and practice, a church well known for its hospitality, depth of heart, art and intellect, and for justice-making.



Having listened to the church for a year now, and in studying the goals by which we steer into the future, I have a sense of where we would like to be:

Could we be a congregation with a reputation for generosity, a church that gives away 5-10 percent of its budget to efforts for justice? This includes giving away the (non-pledge) collection plate every week.

Could we be a congregation where the youth and adults have many experiences of hands-on justice work, from demonstrating on the steps of the Capitol to going on service trips?

Could we be a congregation whose strength in the arts is well-known in central Texas, and where we weave art into worship, into justice work, into intergenerational projects and outreach projects?

Could we be a congregation whose people give and receive skilled pastoral care, where we teach one another, where we pass on our faith and our traditions from generation to generation?

Could we be a congregation with enough space to welcome all who need us, and that space reflects our pride and our joy in the gifts our church brings to our lives and the lives of others?


Could we be a church so skillfully and effectively run, where our staff and financial practices reflect our values, that other churches look to us as a model?

Could we be a congregation where people experience transcendence and deep connection, whether in worship, in chalice circle conversations, in justice work, in doing art, in teaching or fellowship?

Why a 1-2-3 pledge?

This speaks to the "long haul" part of the stewardship theme. We are asking for a three-year pledge, hoping that each year, you will increase the amount of your pledge. If

Where do we grow from here?

First UU is growing and that is a wonderful thing ... however, with this growth, space has become an issue. As a congregation we must continue to be intentionally welcoming to all who enter our doors. That means that we must have sufficient space to fulfill our mission.

To address this isssue, First UU held the first in a series of Town Hall meetings on Sept. 9 in Howson Hall. Rev. Meg Barnhouse and Sean Hale led the meeting and identified several options for dealing with our current and future space needs:

• "Build big" by building a new church;

• Let out the seams in our current location by renovating our existing building;

• Move the church to an existing building in another location;

• Status quo - stay where we are with no changes.

Participants were asked to look carefully at these options and to identify the pros and cons of each.

A second Town Hall meeting is scheduled for Oct. 14 at 1:15 pm. Come and let your voice be heard!

PRESIDENT'S ADDRESS

How big are we and why does it matter?

his is the second in a series of columns I am devoting to church growth. Last month I asked us to consider two questions. How big are we, and why does it matter?



We know we are growing numerically ... just look around on Sunday mornings. But there are other aspects of church growth that are more reflective of our mission to gather in community, to nourish souls, transform lives and do justice.

Maturational growth is the ability of a congregation to encourage all members to grow in the maturity of their faith and deepen their spiritual roots and religious imagination. Incarnational growth is the ability to take the meanings and values of

our UU faith and make them real in me that by adopting

our mission, we have made an implicit if not explicit statement that we want to grow maturationally (nourish souls and transform lives) and incarnationally (do justice). Do you agree?

The efforts we make as a congregation to live our mission will result in both maturational and incarnational growth. Measuring how we are performing as a church in maturational growth and incarnational growth is more critical than simply focusing on numerical growth...it is these aspects that speak to our mission ... our reason for being. Measuring is the job of your board.

There is a fourth aspect of church growth that provides the crucial underpinning for the others. Organic growth captures the tasks of building our community literally and figuratively. It is creating our organizational structures and infrastructure, developing the practice and processes that result in a dependable, stable network of human relationships

and systems in which we can grow and from which we can make a difference.

Our transition to policy-based governance is a form of organic growth. Hiring Carla Jo Schaefer to be our first director of membership and communications is another step in the right direction. We lag behind in organic growth, however, with regard to our physical space. We have recognized for a number of years that our facilities are inadequate for our current congregation, much less the congregation we are becoming.

this very subject: what kind of church we want

to be and what kind of facilities we need to accomplish this vision. One of these discussions took place in September (see sidebar). The next one is Oct. 14 at 1:15 pm. Please put that date on your calendar.

We are also in the midst of our stewardship campaign: All Aboard for the Long Haul. Committing to our mission, to maturational and incarnational growth and to the organic growth necessary for support requires a long journey, not a trip with lots of starts and stops on the local bus. This is why we are introducing multi-year pledging, a new concept for our church, but one that has been used by other thriving congregations. Will the budget we vote on as a congregation in December support our organic growth and help us in turn achieve our maturational and incarnational growth? Will it help us live our mission? Will our pledges over the long haul enable us to nurture our growing congregation and welcome those yet to join us? Let's all get on board and find out!

SOCIAL ACTION UU United Nations office celebrates 50th anniversary 1962 – 2012

The UU United Nations Office will celebrate 50 years of representing UUs at the UN with an event in New York City on Nov. 4. Some of the milestones of the past 50 years include:

• Each year materials are made available for congregations to celebrate the anniversary of the United Nations on a Sunday closest to Oct. 24. Many congregations around the country and in Canada celebrate a UN Sunday, and First UU Austin will host a forum on immigration in the gallery at noon in the Sanctuary, Oct. 21.

• Bruce Knots, executive director of UU UNO is a leader in the Faith and Ethics Network for the International Criminal Court.

• Since 2001 the UU UNO has had a strong Internship Program for students to work at the New York office and participate in briefings and meetings at the UN. Locals interested in applying may contact Celestine Cox with the UU-UNO Internship Program at office@uuuno.org

• The "Every Child Is Our Child" (ECOC) Program began as a response to the UN Millennium Development Goals and the HIV/AIDS crisis. UUs currently support the education of 160 children in Ghana. In addition to school supplies, uniforms, backpacks, and so forth, the children and their foster families are provided with medical insurance. Our own RE children collected money to send to the program last summer.

• From an initial focus on peace and security and denominational support of the UN, UU UNO continues efforts to bring our UU values to the UN's global peace work and current emphasis on climate change and human rights, especially those of women and girls and the LGBT community.

• The UU UNO office provides educational information on current issues on the website. A new religious education curriculum is now available online for children and youth, "UN Me."

• The UU UNO hosts an annual intergenerational seminar each spring. Next year's seminar on the topic "Stop Violence and Discrimination Based on Sexual Orientation and Gender Identity" is planned for April 4-6 in New York City.

UU Youth form close and lasting bonds at UBarU
