Looking back at a historic year

Dear Friends and Family,

It's been quite an historic year for us here at First UU. It has been the year of First UU's 60th anniversary of being recognized as a church by the denomination. Decade by decade, church members gave us on Sundays a brief encapsulation of what was happening at the church during that time. We heard about hardworking volunteers, board members, DREs and ministers.

We hired a company with a reputation for working well with UUs to consult us on how to do the best job possible. Jim Collins was sent from Virginia to stay with us for the summer and keep us on track. We had a Capital Campaign and Annual Stewardship Campaign at the same time. We raised a whopping five times our annual giving, and the annual giving increased by almost 6%. This congregation rocked that campaign! We celebrated in October with a big party where each of our six decades was represented in a classroom, and our partygoers toured from room to room, playing Atari, watching Flashdance, seeing psychedelic peace signs and being invited by hipsters in knit caps to taste kombucha. We had fabulous food and a margarita machine. We thank Ann Edwards and Brendan Sterne for co-chairing the effort, Bill Edwards, Doris Hug, Mary Jane Ford, Peter Durkin, Lisa Carrell for chairing the phases of the effort, Amanda Ray for chairing events, Michael West for holding the spiritual foundation and coordinating testimonials, Michael Kersey for adding his support and keeping minutes, and Mary Patrick for helping the bookkeeping group and for her work with the database. Chris Jimmerson, Carol Drennan, and Vickie Valadez (Communications Coordinator) provided staff support. I was there, and I saw how hard everyone worked. They're still working.

In late spring we welcomed Carol Drennan, from Greenlights, as our Interim Director of Finance and Operations. In her time with us, she suggested moving the offices around so they made more sense, and shifted the supervision of all office staff to herself, and then to Chris Jimmerson, who replaced her. She gave us a good report on our systems and



governance and began simplifying some of the ways we do our bookkeeping. We welcomed Chris Jimmerson as the new full-time director in late September, but restructured the job a bit to make him Assistant Minister of Administration. He is tasked with doing the job from a more pastoral perspective, and he will be doing other ministry in the congregation as well. First UU gets to ordain him to the UU ministry, too! Save the date: Feb. 22.

Our Social Justice Ministry has been very active this year and I will be talking in detail about the many projects when we meet at the Congregational meeting after the second service on Dec. 14. I think you'll be thrilled. Art Mission and the Gallery jointly sponsored a group of female vets who wanted to use our space to do art. They have been working at First UU, and they had a moving exhibit in the gallery in November.

Lifespan RE has been training record numbers of volunteers to work with our children. The Senior High youth group is burgeoning at about 27 folks, the Junior High youth group is thriving, and the

During the weekend of November 14-16, Assistant Minister Chris Jimmerson facilitated a series of Town Hall meetings in Howson Hall at First UU. These get-togethers provided a forum for the discussion of ideas and concerns regarding our upcoming building expansion process. Areas discussed included setting priorities on where to start, "pain points" on our current grounds, environmental concerns, and the best ways to express our values through our physical structure. I am thankful for this democratic process that allowed all to voice their wishes and concerns.

On December 14 the All-Congregational meeting will be held. All members of the church are welcomed and encouraged to attend. Friends and visitors are also welcome to attend, but will not be allowed to vote. Our governing bylaws state: "Individuals who have been members of the church for 30 days or more and who have (as an individual or part of a family unit) made a recorded financial contribution during the last 12 months



and at least 30 days prior to the meeting, have the right to vote at all official church meetings."

At this meeting, Reverend Meg will discuss the progress of the Capital Campaign and building expansion. The 2015 budget will be voted on, and we will also be selecting our 2015 monthly special offerings recipients. In that regard, it has come to my attention that presently we're about \$3,000 behind the amount we collected at this point last year for these nonprofits. Please make sure to support these very worthy nonprofits before the end of the year.

Mark your calendars for the Fall Congregational meeting on December 14 at 1:30 p.m. in the sanctuary. Childcare will be available for both meetings.

Do you have some feedback or questions for the board? You can visit with us at the 6 p.m. F.RE.D. dinner, on the first Wednesday of the month. The monthly board meeting is held on the third Tuesday of each month in the gallery and visitors are welcome.

They monitor all the ministries of the church, they make sure I'm staying within the "Executive Limitations" laid out for me, and they grow deep roots in the spiritual practice of service to a congregation by reading together, and considering how best to listen to the congregation and steer it into the future.

This feels like a very good time in the life of the congregation. The music is marvelous, the staff is skilled and good to work with, and the ministers are proud to serve at First UU.

We have all heard the Unitarian joke about changing a light bulb. You know the one: "How many people does it take to change a light bulb?"

The answer is 300:

It takes ALL the wonderful people in our church who took the time to go through their shelves and boxes and come up with 324 books! Thanks to all of you so much; and special thanks to Dale Bulla, as well as Eileen and Drew Liedeker for the large number of books they donated.

Most members of First UU are aware of the work of the clinic. Its mission is to improve the health of medically underserved and uninsured Central Texans by providing high-quality affordable health care. This is accomplished by the health, development, and behavioral programs the clinic offers. Sentiments of the clinic are shared by many of us in the church.

There is an array of opportunities for volunteers at the clinic. One ongoing effort by church members is the "Mostly Tuesday Collating Group" that meets monthly to put together various packets that are needed by the staff to impart information to the clients. SafePlace Ending Sexual and Domestic Violence

The Austin nonprofit SafePlace is the December recipient of the final Monthly Service Offering for 2014. SafePlace's mission is ending sexual and domestic violence through safety, healing, prevention and social change.

SafePlace has an array of programs to provide comprehensive support for their clients, to assist them through the recovery process at every step. This blog article from their website, "Peer Support: Survivors Helping Each Other Heal," by volunteer Lisa Pous, discusses their recently introduced Peer Support program.

"There are times when all of us need a role model to show us what we can do and where we might go. And sometimes, after months or even years of isolation, 'I've been there,' are the words survivors need to hear the most.

That's why we've started connecting people who have come through our programs with those at the very beginning of their healing process. The program, called Peer Support, began through the efforts of Lisa Pous, who has remained connected to SafePlace since spending two years in shelter and supportive housing recovering from abuse and trauma.

Even after Lisa felt like she had reached a place of peace in her own life, she kept coming back. "I thought to myself, I know how to get through crisis now, and I know how to survive. But I want more." So Lisa engaged with SafePlace, and she helped bring the perspective of a survivor to her role as a volunteer leader and educator in the Life Skills and Survivor Voices program. "Then one day I tripped on a TEDTalk and realized that there was a name for what I'd been doing," she said, "Peer support!" It was the missing piece.

The program is in many ways a return to the roots of the domestic violence movement, which has always been survivor-led. Lisa worked with staff members to develop training and supervisory protocols, while also working toward her own Peer Support Specialist certification. The Peer Support program is trauma-informed, survivor centered, and empowerment based, with roots in the 12-step model and social justice movement. And today at SafePlace, 14 Peer Support Volunteers meet twice a month with survivors staying in the Kelly White **Emergency Shelter.**

Victims of abuse have often experienced months or even years of isolation from other support systems like family, friends and co-workers. Through the Peer Support Program, they are able to begin building new relationships with people who know what they are going through.

"Peer Support is the greatest instiller of hope we can provide," says Supportive Housing Advocacy Manager Erin Goodison. "For our clients, seeing survivors who have successfully rebuilt their lives — and now dedicate their time to helping others — is both inspiration and motivation through difficult times."

Knowing that the person facilitating group has left violence and trauma and reached a place of safety, stability and peace can be more impactful for survivors than any statistic, book or brochure that we could share with them. Peer Support gives people healing from violence, abuse and trauma a person to look to and say, 'I could be like that.'"

All groups supported by Monthly Special Offerings will receive a check at the end of the year, when the total of the 12 monthly donations will be divided equally.

3) Invite a representative of the organization to visit congregants in the gallery on the day of the offering to provide further information about volunteer opportunities

Advice from Covenant Corner

Dear Covenant:

Rumors have been circulating in our church about actions on the part of our staff and leadership that seem to be uncharacteristic. More than one person has expressed to me their deep unease about what they have heard. I find it hard to believe those being accused would do anything so out of covenant. I don't know what to think. What can I do?

— Upset & Uncomfortable

Dear Upset:

Rumors and gossip are part of the human condition. In some organizations, they are a major source of information. Often, however, they do far more harm than good. In our church, where we covenant to be better people and make the world a better place, it is especially disturbing to suspect our leaders of out-of-covenant behavior when acting on behalf of our congregation.

Unfortunately, rumors and gossip abound where the stories are personal. Both ethically and often legally, the personal information is privileged and cannot be shared. While leaders may be able to shed some light on events, the story involved is not theirs to tell. Where does that leave us? Under these circumstances, it seems impossible not only to speak directly to those whose actions we question, but also to do so in a spirit of compassion and good will—to question with curiosity and respect. And yet, that is exactly what we have promised to do.

If you are not comfortable speaking directly to those involved, refrain from gossip. Ask yourself, "If it were my story, would I want others telling it?" Consider that in a church community, we are called to trust our ministers and elected leaders to follow the policies approved by our board.

This is a time to remember that one of the ways we have promised to sustain our community is by honoring our commitments to ourselves and one another for the sake of our own integrity and that of our congregation.

Advocate values at the Capitol with UUs across Texas on Jan. 20

Vans full of UUs from around Texas will travel to Austin for the Texas UU Justice Ministry Legislative Action Day on Tuesday, January 20. It's time to get organized to promote UU values with legislators as they kick off the 2015 session.

We're looking for First UU members to join us as we prepare for the big day and schedule advance appointments with legislators in our home districts. To learn more either attend the next Action for Justice meeting on Monday, Dec. 15, visit us at the Social Action table in the gallery after one of the Sunday worship services, or email Peggy at <u>socialaction@</u> <u>austinuu.org</u>.

We'll start our day at the Capitol in room E2.026 at 8:30 a.m. Rev. Carlton Smith, a member of the UUA Southern Region Life Staff, will talk about how our Texas issues connect to the larger UUA picture. Representative Donna Howard, a fellow UU, will share an overview of what to expect from the legislature and how we can best advocate our values.

We'll learn how to conduct advocacy meetings with our legislators by roleplaying with First UU member Karen Neeley, who's worked as a lobbyist for community banks for 25 years. We'll also receive one-page, informative flyers to leave with legislators, which tell about both Unitarian Universalism and our main issues: women's reproductive justice, Medicaid expansion, and economic justice.

From 11 a.m.-3 p.m. we'll visit legislators from our districts, and from 3:30-4:30 p.m. we'll reconvene as a group to debrief our day before heading home.

Those planning to arrive Monday, January 19 will have the option of a special 7 p.m. tour of the Capitol by Karen Neeley, who will show us the shortcuts, back stairways and other secret spaces most people never discover, along with sharing a few juicy stories.

Multicultural Texas

with Frank de la Teja

Historian Frank de la Teja thinks you have to get beyond traditional themes tied to a narrow segment of the population in order to understand what really makes Texas distinctive. Dr. de la Teja, professor of history at Texas State University, says the traditional focus on the Battle of the Alamo and the history of Anglo-American settlement and economic development of the state leaves out critical parts of the story of Texas. The modern-day diversity of Texas traces back centuries, before the 1800s, to the time when Texas history was the history of northeastern Mexico. And the Texas identity of today also is a direct product of radical social, economic, and political changes the state has undergone since 1900, says de la Teja. In his words: "The story of the 19th century may be romantic and nationalistic, but it does not give students a sense of why Texas is the way it is today. The 20th century story does that."

Dr. de la Teja has spent his career studying and teaching others about the historical realities that have made Texas truly a multicultural crossroads, far removed from the monochromatic myth of the Lone Star State. He has served as the state historian of Texas. He holds a Ph.D. in Latin American History from UT Austin. De la Teja has been active in promoting the teaching of a broader vision of Texas history in our public schools, with emphasis on the state's earlier and more recent history and its strong ties to the history, culture, and demographics of Mexico.

De la Teja was born in Cuba, raised in New Jersey, and came to Texas to earn his doctorate in colonial Latin American history. He worked as a research assistant for novelist James Michener, who was writing a book on Texas at the time. De la Teja later worked as an archivist for the Texas General Land Office. Since 1991, he has taught history courses at Texas State University, including Critical Issues in Texas History, Spanish Borderlands, History of Mexico to 1848, and Introduction to American Indian History.

DECEMBER 14

Marriage Equality, Gender Identity and Sexual Orientation: Employment Law Update

with Sheila Gladstone

Huge legal changes providing workplace protection for the LGBTQ community have been sweeping the country, and may even come to Texas soon. In addition, last year's US Supreme Court decision holding that the federal Defense of Marriage Act (DOMA) is unconstitutional, and the numerous courts following suit on state same-sex marriage bans, have already changed the definition of "spouse" in numerous federal workplace laws. Only one federal appeals court has (just recently) upheld state law bans, and here in Texas, same-sex marriage bans in the State Constitution and the Texas Family Code are up on appeal and will likely be decided soon. Now that there is a split in the circuits on the constitutionality of state law marriage bans, will the US Supreme Court finally take the issue up? What is the future on sexual orientation and sexual identity discrimination in the workplace, and how does it work when a city ordinance bans it but the state does not? We will discuss these timely issues and more.

Sheila Gladstone, a principal attorney with the Austin law firm of Lloyd Gosselink Rochelle & Townsend, P.C., has been practicing, speaking and training on employment law for over 26 years. She is passionate about this topic of gender issues in the workplace, and fascinated by how quickly American workplaces are changing and judges are jumping to make sure they are not on the wrong side of history. Sheila graduated with high honors from the University of Arizona College of law, where she was an editor of the Law Review, and she has served as board president at the First Unitarian Universalist Church of Austin. Sheila is a frequent and popular speaker and writer on current workplace issues such as discrimination, harassment, disability and family leave, wage and hour law, and conducting internal investigations. For several years running, she has been among the five percent of Texas attorneys selected for the Texas Super Lawyers list, which recognizes outstanding professional achievement.
