## **JANUARY 6**

#### Legislative Session Preview

WITH STATE REP. GINA HINOJOSA

State Rep. Gina Hinojosa (D-Austin) returns as Forum speaker to provide a preview of the new session of the Texas Legislature starting January 8. Rep. Hinojosa has made her mark in the Legislature as a forceful advocate for increased state funding of the public schools, capitalizing on her background as president of the Austin ISD school board. School finance is sure to be among the foremost issues addressed in the 2019 session.

Another key concern of the session will be the continuing effort by Gov. Greg Abbott and his legislative allies to trump local decision-making on a wide range of topics, including property tax rates, local sick-leave policies, and the treatment of immigrants in our community. Hinojosa will be in the thick of this preemption fight as well, challenging the stance of the governor with legislation like her bill to restore local discretion to restrict use of plastic bags by retailers.

Hinojosa brings a long history of social-justice engagement to her work in the Legislature. After completing her undergraduate degree as a Plan II Honors/Government major at the University of Texas at Austin and her law degree at George Washington School of Law, Hinojosa worked for: the AFSCME union representing state and local government employees; the Office of Immigrant Concerns with Catholic Charities; Texas Rural Legal Aid; and the Texas Equal Justice Center, where she helped secure wages wrongfully withheld from low-paid workers. Hinojosa also

volunteered over the years with Austin Interfaith and was a key leader in the group's successful efforts to require corporations that receive economic incentives from the city of Austin to pay their employees a living wage.

Rep. Hinojosa will discuss the upcoming session against the backdrop of the November 2018 election results and will highlight opportunities for grassroots involvement.

#### **INSIDE AMIGOS**

Our immigrant friends went to advocate on the Hill, working to build support with U.S. Congressional representatives and senators to move ICE to use prosecutorial discretion.

Sanctuary Network Austin members visited 15 offices in DC. Jesus Salcido, Sulma Franco, Peggy Morton and Gabriela Vera followed Hilda and Alirio's lead as they shared their need to escape violence in their homeland. These asylum seekers have taken sanctuary for more than a year at St Andrews Presbyterian Church and First UU Austin, respectively, waiting for their day to come to speak on their own behalf and find safety in a country built on the belief that we are all equal and all have an inalienable right to freedom from persecution, shelter in the face of fear, and hope for a life of opportunity.



#### FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK

## State of the Church Rev. Meg Barnhouse Senior Minister



First of all, I want to tell you something you already know; we have a great team here. Working with Chris, Brent, and Jules is a joy. To have Shannon and Bear in the office is to see things get done with style and cheer, and we are pleased to welcome our new seminary student intern, Lee Legault. She is a Unitarian Universalist student at Austin Presbyterian Theological Seminary. Lee will be completing an unpaid part-time APTS field placement for 15 hours a week. It will feel good to be a teaching church again.

We have changed from having an in-house local book keeper to working with a CPA-supervised group in NC. They are responsive and patient, and we have been working with them to take better care of our donors by having fewer mistakes on donor reports and greater ease in correcting discrepancies. We also have hired a local CPA to look over our systems and procedures to let us know how best to document those procedures and minimize risk for the congregation.

Right now our priority in the Faith Development Department is to build volunteer teams so that Jules can build a large-church FD program that doesn't just depend on her and the classroom teachers. If you would like to help build this program, please do meet with her for coffee or lunch. She is very easy to talk to.

The building project is making

progress, and we can see the differences in our church! We are back in the sanctuary, although our permit to use the new part is still pending. When it comes through by mid-January (that's the latest estimate) we will have use of it, the new kitchen, and our north parking lot once more. We have had delays and nasty surprises, but we can see things moving forward, and we like that. The plan is to have a building dedication party and picnic on the grounds on May 19th, so put that on your calendars!

Another development is that we are now live-streaming our services. You can watch, music and all, on the church's public Facebook page. Just Google-search FUUCA Facebook and you should get right to the page. If you can't "attend" in real time, the page saves all the services so you can go back and catch up. The HD cameras we will be using, the beefier broadband and money for advertising this new service come from a generous grant from long-time member Susan Barry, and from Paula Wiesner.

Our guest in sanctuary was given a brief four months of freedom, and we will continue to work with him and the Austin Sanctuary Network for his permanent stay of deportation.

It's been a good year, but a hard year. Construction has squeezed some people out of attending due to space limitations, parking difficulties, and general topsy-turvy-ness. Because of that, we are missing seeing the faces of

some of our regulars. Because of that, we are grateful to and proud of the people who struggle on in and attend in the midst of the mess! Because of that, our cash flow hit a dry spot, and we had to shout out for help, and help arrived. People paid on their pledges and we are ok for right now.

Next year is another matter. Our stewardship drive came up a little short, and so Margaret Borden had an idea. She gave 5,000 in seed money for a matching fund. 5 others stepped up to match her and now we have a 30,000 fund for matching any increases in member pledges. If you can increase your pledge a bit more, it will be doubled! We have been trying to stabilize the church's finances for the past three years or so. It's wearing to be on a roller coaster, not knowing what next year will bring. This church deserves the dignity of being well-funded, even if it's just to our bare-bones level. If you can increase your pledge some, that amount will be doubled, and you will be contributing to a church that can do more than worry about money for services and salaries. We need you! We are so grateful for the generosity of our membership. We are creating a welcome space where more members will feel welcome, and where the place will be more attractive for rentals, so we're hoping this roller coaster situation will be a thing of the past fairly soon. Thank you for being here now, being the ones who brought us through.

The End, A Beginning

Greetings and Happy New Year! Feliz año nuevo! To say that 2018 has been a year of challenges might be an understatement. For me, both professionally and personally. For our country, real and imagined (but mostly real). And for our church, which has weathered changes on so many fronts. (Do I really need to name them all?)

While this year has been full of turmoil, it has been both intellectually and spiritually fulfilling to serve as your President on the Board of Trustees. Every third Tuesday of the month, eleven volunteer members of this community meet to reconnect with our moral ownership, monitor our progress towards our Ends, and think about topics that will help shape our future. I can't begin to tell how grateful I am for these people and the work they do, but mostly you should know that you are well represented. If you have been or are considering running for a position on the board, you could do no better than to have the opportunity to work with this group (ask me how!).

This board set out to continue the good work of the previous board by working with Rev. Barnhouse to define the measures by which we will evaluate our progress and reworking some of our policies to better reflect our new Ends. Along the way we also took on the question of how to define our moral ownership -- that is to say -- the group of people to whom we are beholden. In case you haven't seen it, here is what we came up with:

The moral owners of First Unitarian Universalist Church of Austin are the past, present and future congregation and those with whom we work to co-create the Beloved Community.

It is through this work that we decided we should reinstitute the Congregational survey, which went out in November. How better to know if we are making progress towards our Ends than by asking the current congregants how they believe we are doing with respect to meeting them? We also asked demographic questions in an effort to better understand who we are now and in the future. It is our intention to roll out this survey on an annual basis as one measure in our evaluation and one touch point in linkage with you.

And finally, we have been focused on exploring the Beloved Community. What is the work that is being asked of us? What was the origin and context of the vision of Beloved Community? What shall we do in the coming months and years to move us towards realizing our Mission? First we took on a study of Dr. King's passage, which has been written in the order of service and posted on our walls. The passage was taken from the King Center website (http://www. thekingcenter.org/king-philosophy), which goes deeper into what he calls the "Triple Evils" and prescribes six principles of non-violence as a means for attacking the injustice. This work and our discussions led us into a shared reading of "White Fragility" by Dr. Robin Diangelo. We are exploring together how we have observed or realized an act of white privilege and, more importantly, our own challenges navigating the waters of conscious and unconscious biases here at church and beyond. Our collective work has to start within and among and it must be honest and must come from a place of vulnerability.

And so here we at the beginning of a new year, in a new church, and with a new mission. That is to say, we are at the end. Shall we begin?

#### **JULES' DESKTOP**

About Five Blocks Jules Jaramillo Director



Whenever possible and no matter where we have lived, once a week, my husband and I take a walking adventure. We figure out where we want to go, the path we are going to take to get there- I ask him how far it is we are going, and he tells me, "About five blocks." We smile at each other and head out on our way. We take in the sights, people watch, window shop if in the city, or if outside the urban area- connect with the natural world. We usually end up at our destination but sometimes get pleasantly distracted by something altogether different for the day.

Our adventures weren't always like this. Years ago, when we first started these weekly outings, our process was slightly different. We would decide where we wanted to go, the path we would take, but when I would ask how far we were going; Fernando would tell me the exact distance. Sometimes the answer would be a mile and sometimes more. We would start our adventure the way I described above; enjoying every step and every sight but then, apparently, at about five blocks into our walk someone might have started to get a little impatient. They may have even begun to wonder exactly how far away the destination was. There may have also been a few sighs and a whine in their voice that could have been misinterpreted as complaining - just a little bit.

What changed about how I experienced our adventures together was that one day before we left, I asked my usual question about how far we were going but instead of telling me the exact distance, Fernando looked at me and asked, "What if I told you about five blocks?" With his single question, my experience of our time shifted from a focus (and sometimes impatience) of getting to our destination to embracing the textures of journeying. It changed everything about the time we spent together.

Recently, I have been asking myself what areas in my life needs the reflection of "about five blocks". Where in my life might I be getting a little cranky because I am too focused on merely getting there? Have I missed the view in my peripheral because my vision is too hyper-focused? Is there beauty I have overlooked, dismissed opportunities of grace, and dear hearts I haven't connected with because I am three steps ahead rather than as close to this moment as possible?

Now is the time that we welcome January and a New Year. For many, it begins with great intentions, and others even some resolutions. In these hopes for good things and blessings for 2019, my prayer is that we all hold close as many "about five blocks" moments as we can. May you remember to take in the sights, people watch, window shop or connect with the natural world. May you end up at your destination and sometimes get pleasantly distracted by something altogether different. May you see in your peripheral, be graced by the beauty of others, and connect with many a Dear Heart. May your 2019 journey keep you close to every present moment as possible.

# Social Action: MSO Recipients for 2019

On December 16, members of First UU voted on ten of our 2019 monthly special offering recipients. Eight organizations that were funded in 2018 will continue as special offering recipients in 2019. The following organizations are the 2019 recipients: ACLU of Texas, Interfaith Action of Central Texas, UBarU Retreat and Conference Center. Youth Rise Texas, Inside Books Project, Austin Sanctuary Network, People's Community Clinic, Planned Parenthood, UUSC, and SAFE (formerly SafePlace).

First UU members this year

also voted to provide funding to two organizations that did not receive funding last year: Youth Rise Texas and the Austin Sanctuary Network. Youth Rise Texas gives young people harmed by criminalization and deportation a space for community-building and transformational healing. Its programs help these youth become long-term leaders for justice who work to change public opinion about target issues and win local campaigns to make Texas a safer place for all families.

ASN has stopped deportations for six immigrants with deportation orders by moving Immigration

Customs Enforcement to grant prosecutorial discretion six times, more than any other sanctuary group in the U.S. ASN is a group of mostly volunteers that has grown to include 30 Austin area congregations and non-profits who affirm the inherent worth and dignity of everyone and the ongoing responsible pursuit of truth.

The remaining two monthly special offering slots will go to the Texas Unitarian Universalist Justice Ministry and an organization selected as part of Spring into Action.

In October 2018, in preparation for the 2019 Texas legislative session, 35 leaders from 13 UU congregations across Texas gathered at Wildflower UU Church here in Austin for the Alan Lummus TXUUJM General Assembly 2019 Legislative Training. TXUUJM hosted the training in honor of founding board member Alan Lummus, who passed away in 2017. Those present at the training (and a handful of tech-savvy UUs who joined remotely via Facebook Live!) discussed TXUUJM's key issues for 2019: reproductive justice, immigration/refugee

justice, economic justice, environmental justice, and education. Speakers included Carisa Lopez from Texas Freedom Network, Aly Tharp from UU Ministry for Earth, and Jenny Hixon from RAICES. Attendees heard about what to expect from the 2019 legislative session and discussed how to effectively represent our UU values to state legislators. As a congregation, we delegate (via our bylaws) the day to day running of our church. We retain several important responsibilities, one of which is to approve our church's annual budget. Thank you to everyone who came and participated in this vital aspect of church life!

#### **Testimonial**

Like many of us I suppose, I am a convert to Unitarian Universalism. I like to think I've been a UU most of my life, I just didn't know it until my 40's!

Like many of us I'm sure, after my departure from my previous religious faith I didn't immediately convert to Unitarian Universalism. Frankly, I didn't even know about it. Mary, our two teens and I drifted for several years, trying a few things but nothing really fit. As a substitute for church we would go into the living room on Sundays, where we took turns reading. And if we had known

it, our UU roots were starting to show, because we were reading from people like Emerson and Thoreau, and from the Koran as well as the Bible.

Finally, after a few recommendations, we attended the nearby UU church and it was love at first sight. The reading that day – it was Henry David Thoreau! And a passage we had recently read at home. And it was clear that their beliefs did not interfere with their commitment to social justice – their beliefs informed their actions.

Since then, we have come to a deeper and deeper appreciation of Unitarian Universalism, and the role that this church plays in building the beloved community. UU's do that without hesitation. It was before we came to Austin, but the decision by the board to accept someone into sanctuary - that's faith in action. No committee required. And our United Nations Office was able to stand up for LGBT human rights on the global stage and that has made a huge difference – LGBT Human Rights are now included in almost every human rights discussion at the UN.

Mary and I are enthusiastic about supporting this church, because it is what it says it is, it acts on its beliefs, and it is the best way I know of to bring about the world that we would like to see for ourselves, our children, and our grandchildren. It does so much – from worship, to excellent music, religious education, social action, community, and much more.

# Can't the Minister Be My Friend?

Dear Covenant,

I asked the minister if we could go to the movies as I'd like to get to know her better and maybe get to be friends. She said that if we became friends, I wouldn't have a minister any more. What did she mean?

Dear Curious,

Thank you for raising the issue of how a minister relates to congregants.

There do exist ethical guidelines for ministers' relationships with their congregants. These guidelines recognize that, even with the best of intentions and communication, personal relationships are often messy and confusing. The boundaries set by these guidelines minimize the potential for problems if ministers were to treat or lean on congregants as they would a personal friend. The boundaries also recognize that any time a minister is around any congregant, they are at work.

What does this mean? Ministers call us to our best selves. They serve as both teachers and counselors regardless of the setting in which they meet us. Whether at church on Sunday morning, or at a fellowship event, or a party, or the grocery store, ministers are never "off duty" in the presence of a congregant. This is true even when they are sick, as we discovered when our own minister was recovering from repeated surgeries last year.

As a result of these realities, ministers rarely go to parties, do not send "friend" requests on Facebook, do not seek dinner engagements with individuals and families, do not discuss their own personal questions, do not accept help when sick, and, in general, do not rely on congregants for support when they need help. They rely instead on colleagues and friends outside their church family.

But, ministers are friendly. As a counselor they provide compassion, sympathy, and empathy. They accept friend requests on Facebook. They have working lunches with congregants or lunches just for getting to know a congregant. In all things church-related—worship, justice work, pastoral care—ministers want to be in right relationship with their congregants. And a good place to understand how right relationship begins is in our own Covenant of Healthy Relations, which we read before every congregational meeting and which is prominently displayed in Howson Hall.
