UU and You: Learning Our History

Sometimes congregants and visitors want to know who we are by looking deep into who we have been. Our past as Unitarians, Universalists, and Unitarian Universalists helps inform a future of liberal religion, seeking truth and meaning in this world, and delighting in the spark we see within one another. There are so many good resources for the history of our church before and after the unification of the two branches of Unitarianism and Universalism. Here is a short list of excellent books that can walk you through the phases, faces, and places that make us who we are and how we work in this world. We hope that these, and any further sources you find, are helpful to you as you learn more about the spiritual and historic nature of the Unitarian Universalist movement.

American Universalism by George Hunstston Williams, fourth edition (Skinner House Books, 2002). A classic, digestible study of two hundred years of Universalist history in the United States of America.

A Faith People Make: Illustrated Unitarian Universalist Lives by Stephen Kendrick (Universalist Church of West Hartford, CT, 1997). Good capsule portayals of twentyone notables, from Priestley to Reeb. We Would Be One: A History of Unitarian Universalist Youth Movements by Wayne Arnason and Rebecca Scott (Skinner House Books, 1993). A thorough treatment of how Unitarian and Universalist youth organizations evolved from the late 19th century to the present; with photos!

The Gospel of Universalism: Hope, Courage, and the Love of God by Tom Owen-Towle (Skinner House Books, 1989). A thin, but resonant, volume of twenty vignettes that reflect on the power of Universalism's guiding principles.

A Stream of Light: A Short Story of American Universalism edited by Conrad Wright, second edition (Skinner House Books, 1989). A scholarly set of five essays that present five early generations of Untarianism.

Three Prophets of Religious Liberalism edited by Conrad Wright, second edition (Skinner House Books, 1986). A powerful portrayal of the most influential sermons by Unitarians William Ellery Channing, Ralph Waldo Emerson, and Theodore Parker, with good contextual and explanatory material about each.

The Unitarians and the Universalists by David Robinson (Greenwood Press, 1985). A concise but thorough summary of our American UU story, with a helpful biographical dictionary.

Pathways to Memberhood

Every 3 months we have a 'Pathways to Membership' class that allows prospective members to meet one another, to learn a little history about Unitarian Universalism and our Church, and to learn more about all the ways in which our community lives out its mission for its members. As the current Board President, I was invited to attend and speak to prospective members. Our former Board President, Carolyn Gremminger, used to tell me this was one of her favorite jobs as President -- and now I can see why!

If you've never attended one our 'Pathways to Membership' classes, I would highly encourage you to do so. It was truly energizing to hear these people who were on the first steps of discovery to speak about finding our community, being inspired by our mission, and learning about all that First UU and the greater Unitarian Universalist Association has to offer. Honestly, it allowed me to see our community through a set of fresh eyes, and it got me thinking not of the Pathways to Membership, but rather the *Pathways to Memberhood*.

While Membership is the act of becoming a member, Memberhood is the act of being an active and engaged member. As the father of three daughters, this got me thinking... If there were Girl Scout-style badges for memberhood, what would they be?

Perhaps a badge for "Spiritual Inquirer" given for participation in one of our Lifespan RE classes for adults, like the Women's Spirituality Group, the Philosophical Inquiry Group, the Religion and Worldviews Book Club or Chalice Circles.

A badge for "Social Justice Warrior" could be given to those members who demonstrate our faith through action perhaps by making lunches for ARCH, repairing home sthrough the Hands on Housing projects, working with the Austin Sanctuary Network, or exploring patterns of White Supremacist thinking as a White ally.

We could have one for "Facilities Facilitator" for working on the grounds, the gardens, or the building ministries. Or, my personal favorite, the "Lifespanner" for volunteering to help in the Lifespan RE as an advisor for High School or Jr High kids, as a teacher in the lower grades, or perhaps even as Prefect at Hogwarts Camp!

I wonder what badges you all would think of? If you were to sit down and create your own pathway to Memberhood, what would it look like? What badges would you design for yourselves? How would you be intentional about earning your badges? But of course, the biggest questions are -- how proudly would you wear those badges and who will you become having earned them?

Sunday Faith Development Classes

Nursery

Every Sunday, childcare is provided for infants and toddlers during the worship services. We have professional childcare staff to provide a safe and nurturing experience for our youngest church goers.

Pre-K

Our faith development begins when learning begins and the 'Celebrating Me and My World' curriculum provides preschoolers with experiences and opportunities to grow in their sense of trust and caring and to develop their self-identity and their sense of connectedness with all of life. We encourage our youngest learners to make a connection to our UU 7 Rainbow Principles through stories, music, movement, and art. Children spend time in community where they build friendships and celebrate learning together.

K-2nd Grades 3rd -5thGrades Head, Heart, and Hands

This year we will be introducing an experiential learning program from grades Kindergarten through 5th grade. We will offer two different classrooms: Kindergarten through 2nd grade and 3rd through 5th grade. The purpose of the age distinction is that children will not only be able to focus in groups with common developmental ranges but they will also have common spiritual development focuses.

LIFESPAN FAITH DEVELOPMENT HIGHLIGHTS

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Methodology Behind Each Center:

Head Center: Individuals that tend to think before acting are driven more by cognitive logic than by emotion. These individuals tend to learn by thinking. They typically theorize first about something and then try it out later, with a 'think-try-think' approach. In addition, introverted personalities tend to process internally and appreciate space to do so through thought and reflection.

Heart Center: Individuals that identify as using their feelings first learn and grow the most when they make emotional connections. They learn by experiencing and seeing how they feel about their environment with a "feel-try-feel" approach.

Hands Center: People who are driven by doing prefer to do things to learn and experience life. They move first into action and find out practically what works and what does not work. Hand learners respond and grow best by direct experience with a "try-think-try" approach.

Our Head, Heart, and Hands program is based in Unitarian Universalist curriculum and each center will contain activities that supports the weekly lesson. The overall program honors individual learning styles providing opportunities for each child to discover and embrace lessons in ways that speak best to them. This method naturally aligns with our UU tradition affirming that each person has a yearning to learn and that children are closely connected with our source of awe and wonder.

Middle School Youth Group (Grades 6th-8th)

Amazing Grace

Our Middle School Youth spend time together developing relationships and learning from one another. They gather in community for social events and justice causes that speak to the entire group. This year they will be exploring Amazing Grace a curriculum that helps young people develop a greater understanding of right and wrong and act on their new understanding. It equips them for moving safely and productively through middle school, where they will be continually tugged toward both ends of the ethics continuum. Through their involvement in Amazing Grace, middle school youth will come to recognize and depend on their Unitarian Universalist identity and resources as essential to their movement toward understanding, independence, and fulfillment of their promise.

Senior High Youth Group

Our Senior High Youth Group share time together building community, peer support, and developing a closer connection to Unitarian Universalism. They are involved in many youth activities throughout the year in our local area and beyond. They are active in outreach, social justice and connected to the larger First UU Church faith community. On Sunday mornings, they will be using 'Soul Matters', a theme based curriculum, to better understand themselves in the context of Unitarian Universalism.

ACADEMIC YEAR IN AMERICA



With school just six weeks away, Academic Year in America (www. academicyear.org) has some 100 foreign-exchange students in need of Host Families for the upcoming school year. Ages 15 to 17, they hail from Austria, Bangladesh, Brazil, China, Germany, Holland, India, Italy, Jordan, Kazakhstan, Kuwait, Morocco, Pakistan, Saudi Arabia, Tanzania, Tunisia and Vietnam. Some of the students are late additions. Others were actually assigned families back during the spring but are now in limbo because their Host Families de-committed for one reason or another.

Additionally, 13 deserving students have qualified for scholarship dollars via the Kennedy-Lugar Youth Exchange and Study (YES) Program, a grant initiative administered by the Bureau of Educational and Cultural Affairs. Established by Congress in response to the 9-11 attacks, the YES program specifically awards students from predominately Muslim countries. The goal is to build "bridges of understanding" between the U.S. and participant countries. Students engage in activities designed to maximize cultural exchange (i.e. students acclimate to a value-based American society, and we gain insight into global regions currently shrouded in misconception). AUSTIN LGBTQIA PRIDE AND FIRST UU

Austin's annual LGBTQIA pride celebration is on Saturday, August 11th, and includes both a festival during the day and a parade in the evening.

At First UU, we're participating in Austin Pride by holding our annual Pride service on Sunday, August 5, and by having a booth at the festival on August 11.

The festival is at Fiesta Gardens, 2101 Jesse E. Segovia Street, from 11 a.m. to 7 p.m. This year, we'll again be sharing the booth with other area UU churches. Planning for our booth is being organized by First UU's Alphabet Soup Social Club but we welcome participation from everyone. If you'd like to take a 2 hour shift staffing the table with other UUs, you can sign up at the Social Action table in the gallery before or after Sunday services or by contacting Tomas Medina at alphabetsoup@austinuu.org. The parade route on Saturday evening is on Congress from the Capitol to 4th Street, kicking off at 8 p.m. This year First UU is focusing all our efforts on the festival and will not have a float in the parade. Instead, we'll be joining the festivities by marching with other contingents or cheering on parade participants. No ticket is needed to watch the parade. DENOMINATIONAL CONNECTIONS

General Assembly Highlights

This June, 15 members of First UU Austin attended General Assembly, including four youth. We were on hand for the bridging ceremony for First UU Austin youth member Bridgett Lewis, and Rev. Chris Jimmerson was recognized for receiving Final Fellowship as a UU Minister. Our delegates also helped to select a new "Congregational Study/ Action Issue" and three "Actions of Immediate Witness".

•2018-2022 Study/Action Issue – Undoing Intersectional White Supremacy

Every two years, delegates at General Assembly debate and vote on a new "Congregational Study/Action Issue", or CSAI. A CSAI is an opportunity for UU congregations to take a topic of concern and engage, reflect, learn, and take action. •"Actions of Immediate Witness"

In addition to the multi-year CSAI, delegates debated and selected three Actions of Immediate Witness, or AIW's, which call for action on urgent social justice issues. The three selected AIW's are entitled "End Family Separation and Detention of Asylum Seekers and abolish ICE"; "Dismantle Predatory Medical Care Practices in Prisons and End Prisons for Profit"; and "We are all Related: Solidarity NOW with Indigenous Water Protectors." This Month's MSO: grassroots leadership Cristina Parker

Many in the First Unitarian Universalist congregation and community are acquainted with Grassroots Leadership, as they have been partners in fighting for sanctuary for our friends Alirio, Hilda, and Ivan, and the congregation voted to focus on them Sunday, Aug. 12 with a monthly special offering. They have also joined forces on other issues impacting our community, like stopping deportations, confronting police brutality, and fighting immigrant detention.

But if you're not familiar with Grassroots Leadership and our team, allow me to introduce you.

When they are not organizing all around Austin, or in Williamson County and Houston, you can find them at their meeting space on Cesar Chavez St. in East Austin. The staff is a diverse team of experts who approach their work with profound knowledge of how the criminal justice and immigration systems impact people and communities. That's because most of the staff have been directly impacted by criminalization in the criminal justice system, immigration system, or both.

Grassroots Leadership has existed for more than 35 years and opened its Austin office about 15 years ago. They believe that working locally is the best strategy to achieve lasting change at the national level. The change we seek is a world where prison profiteering, mass incarceration, deportation and criminalization are things of the past.

helping people gain power A sample of their latest work:

Mothers Fight Back

This summer, they learned of 35-40 women in the T. Don Hutto Detention Center who had been separated from their children at the border. The immigration team organized mothers inside Hutto to fight for their release and to be reunited with their children. So far, four families have been reunited, and seven women have been bonded out of Hutto as part of this campaign.

Austin is a Freedom City

This was a joint response to the crisis created by anti-immigrant state law SB4, and research that proved racist jailing practices in the community. At Grassroots Leadership, they believe in local resistance, so they joined local partners to pass the Freedom City policy, which will limit arrest and jail time for people of color and immigrants in Austin.

Laura Monterrosa and #EllaHabla

At the same time that the #metoo movement was at a fever pitch, Laura Monterrosa told a visitor about the sexual assault she experienced while detained at Hutto. What followed was an intense campaign to release Laura, who was facing severe retaliation inside for speaking out.

Hi, I'm Bear. Yes, really. Bear W. Qolezcua

Where to start with introductions? Some of you remember me and mine from when we attended First UU from the fall of 2014 to the spring of 2016. Some of you have no idea who I am and are probably thinking "who's this guy suddenly haunting the sanctuary and church office?" Well *curtsy*, how do you do? I'm Bear W. Qolezcua.

A little background on who I am and what I do here at First Unitarian Universalist Churh of Austin...

I am the child of immigrants. My Mom was Jewish, practicing Kabbalah, and from the Palestinian Territory. My Dad was a Spanish (Basque and Catalonian) Catholic cum Southern Fundamental Baptist Minister. Personally, I'm a spiritual humanist who finds my connection to the great spark of life through music, though my little traditions are greatly informed by my Louisiana upbringing and Jewish heritage. My Dad was a military chaplain for most of my young life and, because of that, I spent much of my childhood living in places like the USSR, Germany, France, Argentina, Brazil, New Zealand, China, and South Africa to name a few. This granted me a view of the world and its people that my family otherwise could never have afforded me or my siblings.

I hold a BA in English (Creative Writing - Poetry) from Texas State

University and an MA in Theological Studies from Austin Presbyterian Theological Seminary.

While at seminary I was the editor of the student publication, KAIROS, directed the digital signboard (we have one here at the Welcome Center, you should check it out!), worked as a resident assistant, and helped in classes as an Instructor's Aide for Hebrew exegesis. My passion, however, was firmly within KAIROS and the media I was allowed to produce.

In the time I was editor, we took what was normally a 4 - 8 page student powered newsletter and turned it into a 24-32 page newsjournal that featured voices within and without the seminary's halls and classrooms. Theologians, activists, poets, historians, linguistics experts, Christians, folks, Muslims, Atheists, Iewish Buddhists, Black, White, Asian, First Nations, Women, Non-Binary Folk, Men, Young and Elder Adult ... we had contributions across a broad swathe of our community and heard stories and opinions that often challenged and inspired us to greater work as peole and students of theology.

I could not do the work alone. though. My right-hand and braintrust, Madie, gave me more than a few moments of pause and education with her own vast experience and education in English and journalism. Between the two of us we brought KAIROS out of a place of malaise and revived it into a modern digital and print publication for the students, faculty, staff, and alumni of Austin Seminary. It is my proudest achievement from my time in those halls. More so than even the education and degree with which I was honoured.

One plan for the future of this newsletter is to begin featuring art and voices from the church. Whatever fuels and inspires you, I would like to share that with our First UU family. Submissions can be sent to: news@ austinuu.org. Also, in some issues I hope to include a personal piece; be it a letter to the community about current issues in the life of First UU or the world in which we live, a poem, or a photo spread. It is a venue for me to do my job, communications, and be active in the community in my own writerly way.

My little family unit (Gilbert, Frank, and me) is so excited to be here among y'all; learning, working, and getting to see what it is to be a full-fledged UU family. We are all grateful for this opportunity for me to be your FirstUU Communications Coordinator in this thriving, growing community.
